In California alone, statistics show that the government has spent roughly \$41 million dollars on litter removal. Broken down into parts, we spent \$9.8 million dollars on road patrol/pick up, \$13.4 million dollars are sweeping, and \$18 million dollars over litter pick up over 143,000 cubic yards of land. Of course the government of California does in some way enforce the law of antilittering; but it doesn't stop the thousands who inhabit the state from doing it. Fines, if caught in the act, start at \$100 (USD) and eight hours of picking up roadside litter. A defendant's third offense and all subsequent offenses are punished with a minimum penalty of a \$750 fine and 24 hours of litter cleanup (per offense). (Litter. Online.
