As a Christian living in Silicon Valley, I am definitely in the minority. Even though I have found great friends who respect my beliefs, and I respect theirs, it is a wonderful feeling to be able to casually bring up God in a conversation and feel understood.

Having previously lived in Germany, I know what it feels like to have school and Christianity integrated, and I love it! We had a religion class and would walk over to the local Church. That's just one reason why I would love to attend Baylor- the fact that Christianity and education are blended. I appreciate that there are mandatory religion classes because that, to me, shows that those who will attend Baylor will, like me, be serious about growing spiritually as well as intellectually.
