This article provides an overview of compasses, which are essential instruments for navigation. It explains that magnetic compasses, the most well-known type, consist of a magnetized needle that aligns with Earth's magnetic field, pointing to magnetic north and south. The bond between mothers and daughters is remarkably strong, enduring through various life stages. Scientists have conducted studies to understand why depression and other mood disorders often seem to be passed from mothers to their daughters. In one such study, MRI scans were performed on 35 healthy families. The results revealed that mothers and daughters share similar brain anatomy in the region responsible for regulating emotions. Interestingly, this association was even stronger than the connections observed between mothers and sons or fathers and daughters. Essentially, women are more likely to understand and relate to their mothers' emotions, and vice versa.
